





A'Levels v BTEC's

- A Levels very academic study.
- Some careers will requires specific A levels
- (Medicine, Veterinary Science, Law)
- Need to have a passion for learning A levels are a lot of work so this is key!!
- Prefer exams to coursework.
- Helps keep your options open.
- Big leap from GCSES to A levels often you will have achieved at least a grade 6.
- 3 subjects A levels becoming linear rather than modules.

A 'Levels v BTEC's

- BTEC's practical work related courses.
- Wide range from Hair and Beauty, Travel and Tourism, Catering, Construction, Business to Engineering, Dance and Sport.
- Great option if you want to go into a specific career that maybe practical.
- You can go to University if you complete a Level 3 BTEC as equivalent to A levels but you must check with UCAS if accepted!
- If you prefer coursework to exams BTECS may be perfect for you.



6th Form

- Do you enjoy being in a school environment? Sixth
 Form could be perfect for you
- Sixth forms often offer A levels and some BTECS



- Great if you prefer a smaller environment
- May decide to stay at your sixth form because of being familiar with the people and the environment

Apprenticeships

- Available to all age groups over the age of 16.
- Employed you need to find an employer, they pay
 you a training salary and you receive an Employer Led
 recognised qualification for that specific industry.
- Gain valuable workplace skills and experience.
- Over 150,000 employers are offering Apprenticeships.
- Cover over 170 industries & 1500 job roles.
- Majority of apprentices (85%) will stay in employment.
- Employers think that qualified apprentices are 15% more employable than those with other qualifications.

How apprenticeships work

Work 4 days a week and study 1 day at college

Work 5 days a week and have an assessor meet you regularly

Have blocks of work and study



HE - Degree courses

- **Degree courses -** Most full time & 3 years. Some 4 years and include a year in industry. Entry requirements is a minimum of three A levels or the equivalent e.g. a BTEC Level 3 National qualification plus supporting GCSEs.
- Foundation degrees Wide range of work-related subject areas from accounting to zoological conservation! No set qualifications; each institution decides on its own criteria, usually 2 years full time, but available part-time, suitable for those who wish to study while working. Can progress to honours degree with further study.
- **Higher National courses** In work-related subjects ie Travel &tourism management, Business or Construction. HND (Higher National Diploma) courses are at level 5 or HNC (Higher National Certificate) courses at level 4 are normally aimed at those in related employment and are taken part time.



Banking: Barclays Degree Programme - offers both a fast track into leadership and a sponsored degree. You'll learn, earn, and get a degree – all in just three years. The programme has been developed in partnership with the Lord Ashcroft International Business School at Anglia Ruskin University and Nottingham Business School at Nottingham Trent University.

Engineering: Airbus Undergraduate Apprenticeship - 3 years which combines vocational and academic training with on the job experience. Attend one of their partner universities to study for your BEng honours degree.

Need 300 UCAS points and two A Levels grade B and above in Maths and Physics. GCSEs in Maths, English and Science (one of which must be Physics). Paid £13,498 per annum and your tuition fees will be paid for.
